Unit History Highlight

Special Forces

In 1957 the two original Special Forces Groups (10th and 77th) were joined by the 1st, stationed in the Far East. Additional groups were formed in 1961 and 1962 after President John F. Kennedy visited the Special Forces at Fort Bragg in 1961. Nine groups were organized for the reserve components in 1961. (Tsouras, 1994, 91). Among them were the 16th and 17th Special Forces, Groups. However, 17th Special Forces Group, a National Guard formation with elements in Washington, was disestablished on 31 January 1966.

In the early twenty-first century, Special Forces are divided into five active duty (AD) and two Army National Guard (ARNG) Special Forces groups. Each Special Forces Group (SFG) has a specific regional focus. The Special Forces soldiers assigned to these groups receive intensive language and cultural training for countries within their regional area of responsibility (AOR).[22] Due to the increased need for Special Forces soldiers in the War on Terror, all Groups—including those of the National Guard (19th and 20th SFGs)—have been deployed outside of their areas of operation (AOs), particularly to Iraq and Afghanistan. A recently released report showed Special Forces as perhaps the most deployed SOF under USSOCOM, with many soldiers, regardless of Group, serving up to 75% of their careers overseas, almost all of which had been to Iraq and Afghanistan.

Until recently an SF group has consisted of three battalions, but since the Department of Defense has authorized the 1st Special Forces Command to increase its authorized strength by one third, a fourth battalion was activated in each active component group by 2012

A new fuel line was installed and all fluids and filters have been changed. The tail rotor drive shafts have been removed and the hanger bearings have been re-greased. We hope to have her back in

the air in a few short













The Foundations STEM trailer that has been carrying "Annie" has been undergoing a much needed maintenance workup. This trailer travels around the southeastern U.S. with the STEM Outreach Program for school visits and sometimes parades. This fall our Workforce Development Interns along with the mentoring from Tom Robbins (Operations Manager and Ground Vehicle Maintenance Manager) gave the trailer an overhaul of the rear air suspension and braking system. All 4 airbags were replaced along with the airlines associated with the air suspension system and 4 new brake kits were installed. We are currently using the holiday break to install all new wiring and lights for the trailer. We will also be upgrading the air suspension system with a new pump and reservoir tank. The final task to complete all of this will be to paint the entire trailer - color yet to be determined.

EXCUTIVE DIRECTORS NOTES

This will be a very busy first quarter of 2019 for our volunteers and staff as we complete maintenance and upgrades to our fleet of helicopters, fixed wing aircraft, and ground vehicles that support the STEM Education Outreach Program and Workforce Development program. We will continue partnering with Midlands Technical College to provide meaningful construction projects for their dedicated students at our HQs facility - Columbia Metropolitan Airport, SC.

Let me introduce our newsletter readers to "Ms. Kathi", our very special JUH-1 Huey helicopter and STEM training aid. Only four JUH-1 Huey's were manufactured to support the U.S. Army's Stand Off Targeting System (SOTAS) Program. This unique Huey was approved by the Department of Defense, and Defense Logistics Agency for transfer to CFF to support it's education programs. The JUH-1 Huey supported the SOTAS Program in Korea and Europe with it's retractable skid landing gear, advanced belly mounted rotating radar boom, jam resistant data link, all weather avionics and autopilot. CFF members along with help from a Sunshine Solutions transport, picked up this high tech Huey at the Aurora Flight Sciences, a Boeing Company, in Manassas, VA. and transported her back to the Foundation's aviation facility in Columbia, SC. for inspection and FAA flight certification.

While serving at Aurora Flight Services, our new Huey was designated as a UAV—1 by the Department of Defense for Autonomous Aerial Logistics research and development.

This CFF Huey has been named "Ms. Kathi" in memory of Kathi Free who passed away in early 2018 and was a devoted member to the Foundation's mission and it's success.
